I love that this is the most commercial of the Rothenberg paintings I discovered. It's certainly a far cry from the bland scenery and inoffensive colours I associate with corporate commissions! The key attraction for me is the energy and movement of her brushstrokes, and her ability to convey weight, form, and direction with minimal information. I see the continuity with her putting her own physicality into these dancers, just like she did with the horses. Seeing them in a series makes it obvious that each is a dancing figure – I might not be so sure if I saw panel 1, 2, or 4 in isolation. Yet I think each of them is compelling and could stand on its own.
